BSK40 Reflection

Our Big Sky Kids oncology camp director left in April to take care of her mom. I hastily volunteered to lead our Big Sky Kids' Adventure Camp, a 9-day camp for 11 to 18 year-olds who have all experienced childhood cancer, most still in active treatment. Fourteen campers came with a parent. A handful of past campers came back as counselors. I wasn't aware of the identity some people have to Big Sky Kids.

Simply put, the kids were amazing. There was a grace and softness they extended instantly to one another. I was nervous early on if the 11-year-olds and the 18-year-olds would get along. Their collective cancer treatments made age seem trivial. A lodging partner shared how respectful and grateful the Big Sky Kids were; I heard that multiple times from vendors and groups. I was told later that by the second night, campers were staying up late and sitting around talking about their cancer. Parents continued to express how grateful they were to see their children around other kids that knew the experience.

I learned more about childhood cancer and am sad to think of what went unspoken. I learned how much school is missed because of months spent in the hospital. How chemo affects the brain and how it often creates a learning disability. I didn't know that some will never be able to conceive because of their treatment's sterilizing effect. I didn't know that when legs are cut off, the raw end of the bone still tries to grow out, often in spidery splinters. Most kids try to put up with as much pain as they can before another round of surgery. Endless surgeries remove them from school, activities, and socializing with their classmates. The thought of hacking off diseased limbs conjures up images of Civil War field medicine. Modern medicine should have made these barbaric practices obsolete by now.

In a way, it's easy for us to love on these kids. Their parents are just as big of superheroes though, they just don't elicit the same easy compassion. At times the parents shared a dark sense of humor. They joked about endless nights spent in hospitals or recanted their interactions with aloof doctors. I bet all the kids know which of their veins are the best for blood draws. The parents too shared a collective spirit that can only be forged after hearing your 8-year old baby has cancerous

In total, 17 participants, 24 volunteers, and a group of our friends from Counterpoint enjoyed the fruits of the Horticulture Program.

In our garden, each participant cultivated their own raised bed to grow whatever they wanted, and each one turned out unique. Some participants, like Ruth, Billy, and Becky, carefully arranged a variety of veggies. Others, like Mariah and Aaron, dedicated their beds to flowers like zinnia and cosmos. Daniel, Syvel, and Remy planted a mix of both veggies and flowers, while Danielle filled hers with a monocrop of summer squash. Todd is growing the cutest little watermelons! The rest of the garden is a shared space

that we plant and harvest together. We started out the season with fresh lettuce, snap peas, and radishes. As the summer went on, we harvested beets, parsley, and cucumbers. Lately, we've been enjoying corn, tomatoes, and summer squash. Soon, we'll dig up our potatoes!

A highlight of the garden is our "Sunflower Patio." Mammoth sunflowers, more than 8-ft tall, tower over a set of chairs on our newly-installed patio, creating a shaded space to sit and enjoy the peace of the garden.
